Confusing Easter trading rules need an overhaul

New Zealand's confusing, outdated and inconsistent Easter trading rules should be reviewed, National's Workplace Relations spokesperson Scott Simpson says.

"The rules are out of step with the world we live in. It makes no sense that some businesses can trade but others can't, depending on what they sell and where they sell it."

Online businesses can trade without restriction over Easter but many traditional bricks and mortar retailers cannot. The rules governing which retailers can and can't open vary from district to district, and are also different on Good Friday and Easter Monday.

This is confounding for businesses and consumers alike, Mr Simpson says.

"The Government's review of the Holidays Act must take a sensible look at Easter trading rules, which are confusing and regionally inconsistent.

"We need to have an informed discussion as a nation about what businesses can and can't do during public holidays. Changes need to have public input and support. The Labour Government has had nearly four years to do something about this, and every Easter we are reminded how little it has actually done, Mr Simpson says.

"Apart from setting up a working group and receiving a report, nothing has happened. We don't have a clear sense of what the Government wants to achieve or change.

"It's typical of a Government that doesn't have a plan, doesn't understand business and doesn't understand that how and when people want to shop has changed.

Mr Simpson says he is worried the Government is still being influenced too much by trade unions, which only represent a fraction of the total workforce and seem determined to take New Zealand back to the 1970s.

"After the tough year New Zealand businesses have just had, they need some certainly and an understanding of what the Government's plans are. So far they have neither."

Long Term Plan submissions top 1400

The Thames Coromandel District Council has received more than 1,400 submissions on its proposed Long Term Plan 2021-2031.

A council spokesman said while the council didn't have figures for how many submissions had been received from each ward or community board area, there would be an opportunity for the public to look at them "pretty soon," in time for hearings on the Long Term Plan from May 5-7.

The deadline for submissions was April 12 and was preceded by strong calls at a public meeting for Whangamata residents to make sure they had their say.

In a newsletter, the TCDC said all five of the district's community boards had agreed on the details of their submissions to the council's Long Term Plan for 2021 at their recent meetings. The Long Term Plan would not be finalised until the TCDC had considered all the feedback received, the newsletter added.

In its submission to the Long Term Plan, aired at its March 30 meeting, the Whangamata Community Board said it supported the TCDC's "no frills" budget option.

On the issue of a proposed upgrade for the Whangamata Real Estate Community Pool, it submitted in favour of Option 2, for a one-off grant to Whangamata Community Swimming Pool Inc of \$500,000 - the full cost of proposed improvements. A council report on the board's submission mistakenly said it was in favour of Option 1. This proposed a grant of \$330,000 but depended on the community first raising \$167,000 – one third of the total cost.

Pool committee chairman Rob Boston said the error appeared to have been made in the process of putting the report together and had since been retracted.

Boston said he was "reasonably optimistic" that Option 2 would be adopted.

"We'll just have to wait and see what people have come back with in their submissions. I'm hoping that there will be at least 50-80 submissions in favour."

On the issue of the proposed sale of council land in Lindsay Road, valued at around \$3 million, the board submitted in favour of Option 3, requesting that a community trust be given five years to raise the funding required to construct a community hub, including a community marae.

If the community could raise the funds in that time, the council should then consider an appropriate lease to the Trust. If it did not raise the required amount, the TCDC could reconsider the future of the land the submission said.

Locals keen on bus service plan

A proposed once-a-week bus service between Tairua and Thames and Tairua and Waihi has drawn lots of positive feedback since it was aired at a public meeting in Whangamata several weeks ago, says Whangamata resident Carol Smith

The service was proposed by Waikato Regional Councillor Denis Tegg, who is working with Thames Coromandel District Councillor Terry Walker to advance the idea.

Smith, an enthusiastic supporter of the plan, says it is getting plenty of traction among local people.

"There used to be a service here years ago using the school bus to Waihi, but now there's nothing for Whangamata residents at all."

Writing in the RSA newsletter, Smith says bus transport is sorely needed by ageing residents who are no longer able to drive over the winding gorge roads to travel out of town.

She says anyone can be hit by medical conditions that make driving difficult - and it can happen unexpectedly.

"We do have shuttles available only for medical appointments, but no bus service if you fancy a day's shopping, or wish to travel further afield to places such as Auckland or Tauranga by meeting Intercity buses."

Tegg, who was instrumental in establishing the Thames town bus system, is keen to get the proposed service going, Smith says. "He says it will be well subsidised by central government as well as local government, adding only \$3 - \$4 dollars per household to our annual rates.

"But to achieve this service, we need to let our local councillors know that we would like it to happen, either by phone calls or emails. Attending the May Whangamata Community Board meeting to show your support would also be helpful. It won't happen if we don't show support for it!"

Smith says the service could take a year to establish, but a shuttle vehicle could possibly be used temporarily to start it earlier.

Tegg has come up with four public transport options for the Coromandel, including a subregional hub which would use one vehicle to commute between towns.

NZTA would provide 51 per cent of costs, and ratepayers the remainder. It would be up to the councils involved to work out how funding would be divided, Tegg has said.

Last month he told Whangamata residents at a meeting to discuss the Thames Coromandel District Council's long term plan that a subregional hub option could include a flexible booking system with passengers able to book a trip online or by phone up to 15 minutes before the bus departed.

Park concerts could make a comeback

New Year's Eve concerts in Williamson Park could make a comeback next summer as a means of keeping a lid on bad behaviour by teenagers.

The Whangamata Community Board has called for expressions of interest from experienced event managers interested in organising a "family friendly" event.

The call follows this year's late night incident which saw drunken teens rampage through the park, hurling bottles at police and bystanders and vandalising property.

The board said interested parties would take on the overall operational and financial responsibility for organising the event, with administrative and communications support from the Thames Coromandel District Council. It is understood that if noone steps up to organise an event, basic security will still be provided in the park to stem trouble.

The call for expressions of interest is likely to be greeted as good news by Whangamata resident Susan Coffey, who told the board at their March 30 meeting that the community should stage entertainment on December 30 and 31 aimed at 14 to 17-year-olds.

Coffey suggested hiring a DJ who



could "read the crowd and play whatever the kids want to play".

She claimed most of the trouble on New Year's Eve had been caused by one group of youngsters who had become bored and frustrated because their older friends and relatives were attending a concert at Joe's Farm.

Meanwhile, the Whangamata Ratepayers' Association supports the "reinvention" of the former Holiday Festival Committee to organise entertainment over the Christmas-New Year period.

At the March meeting of the community board, the Whangamata Ratepayers Association called for community consultation over where entertainment should be held. An association spokesman suggested a concert for teens could be held at Joe's Farm where all the necessary infrastructure was in place for security and management of the sale of alcohol and transport..

Thames Coromandel District Councillor Terry Walker says holding a concert at Williamson Park could be problematic due to consent conditions.

"No fenced or ticketed events are allowed over New Year's Eve. But an open or sponsored event is allowed as long as noise, rubbish are managed and no alcohol is permitted.

"The day before and New Year's Eve at Williamson Park are the key nights and it's mostly the 12-17 year olds who gather in the park to mix and mingle and don't create any problems.

"When there is no entertainment for the majority of kids, they react to the few bad eggs, resulting sometimes in some small damage or 'kid fights'." In the past, the community board had also funded a "safe zone" away from the park where any alcohol affected young people can be taken to sober up and parents contacted, Walker added.

Entertainment in the park on New Year's Eve has caused controversy in the past, with nearby residents expressing concern about the behaviour of teenagers since the early 2000s.

At a community board meeting in early 2018, residents noted evidence of young people preloading on alcohol and "behaving badly" after a concert on New Year's Eve had finished.

In earlier years, despite a heavy police presence, there have been reports of teens as young as 12-14 turning up drunk and causing trouble.

However, TCDC District Events Coordinator Kirstin Richmond said police were keen to reassure the public that although there had been a "blip" last year, the number of arrests was going down and serious assault incidents had also decreased over the past three years.

Everyone deserves a great leader: Goal setting

A few issues ago, I promised to unpack the Four Core Conversations needed to be an effective leader. This week I want to share the Goal Setting conversation. Goals and tasks need to be both clear and compelling.

For goal or task to be clear, it needs to have a start, and an end, and the quality of the goal or task needs to be explicit. The individual needs to know what a good job looks like, and it needs to be short and sharp. The Action Plan or "how" the goal or task is done, need not be included in the written goal or task statement – that is a separate conversation.

Compelling, means the person needs to be enthusiastic about getting it done or at the very least, know why it is important to both the organisation and them

as an individual. This may need some thoughtful input around aligning the goal or task with the individual's purpose. For example, they may need to know that their contribution by completing the

task to the required standard enables the business to turn over a profit, which in turn enables them to have a job!

Lastly, it vital to check for

understanding. Get the person to repeat the goal or task back to you to ensure you were clear in explaining it. If you ask, "Do you understand the goal?", and they reply "Yes", neither person actually knows if effective communication took place.

Leadership is something you do with people not to them. With any goal or task, it is critical to discuss it with people ... not just tell them.

TSUNAMI ALERTING METHODS

Thanks to everyone who attended our public forums on tsunami and other emergency alerting methods on the eastern seaboard of the Coromandel last week - they were well attended.

Similar forums will be held in west coast communities in May. Dates and locations will be announced soon.



For anyone who missed the forums and would like more information, you can find the tsunami sirens FAQ document at tcdc.govt.nz/tsunamisirens

The existing tsunami warning sirens in our district are being disconnected in September 2021 from the pager system that activates them. They are not compliant with national standards and the National Emergency Management Agency has told our Council to disconnect them or install compliant sirens. These would come at an estimated cost of \$5-\$11 million.

Our current sirens reach fewer than 43 per cent of the district, and are often inaudible due to wind, location or double-glazing on windows.

The competition will be full on from the start with only four days of surfing to complete the event. With four person heats to start with, and only the top two progressing pressure will be on. Ella admits to still feeling nervous before competition, but feels that it's a good thing, it shows that you care and that she can channel the nerves and use them to compete at her very best. The Americans have an impressive team, with Honolulu surfers John Florence and Carissa Moore (current World champ), but watch out also for Aussie Stephanie Gilmour (seven-times World champ) and

a strong Brazilian presence with Gabriel Medina and reigning world champ Italo Ferreira.

When asked about choice of equipment Ella says she is taking a range of sizes to cover all possible conditions, and while she doesn't have a favourite board there is one that may be saved for this special occasion.

Williams confesses that not being able to have any family or friends at the event as support is a big blow as she had planned to have a big team attending.

Ella is very aware of the history of this occasion, how unique it is and the importance of enjoying the moment. She feels that all that she has done in the past is leading to this momentous time in her life.

While realising that these Games may be known as the Covid Games, Ella is still working through the need to consider having the Vaccine before leaving. Like all top athletes she is very aware of the possible impact of any foreign substance entering her system, but is also aware that a vaccine is most likely to be better than contracting Covid. He joined Whangamata Coastguard as a volunteer in 1991 and was an influential member of the team through to 2011. He served as President in 2002and 2003 and as a Committee member for many years. His operational roles were, radio operator, duty officer and many will remember his voice on the air in the evenings from his "home-base" station monitoring trip reports.

In 2008 he was awarded Honorary Life Membership in recognition of his valuable service.

With his vast technical knowledge, Nobby was a key player in the establishment and maintenance of our current marine radio repeater site and for years he was our radio service guru. Any communications issues that arose were always referred to him. "Nobby will know how to fix that" was the usual response. His influence in the



decision making surrounding the purchase of our first Rescue Vessel in 1998/99 was a strong part of discussions at the time.

It is important that our current volunteers and members recognise that the well -established Coastguard unit that we have today is built on the efforts of volunteers such as Nobby whose earlier work set the foundations.

Kiwi Whisky Smugglers the first to swim to Slipper Island

Alex and Nick Ravenhall are two Kiwi brothers who have been holidaying in the family bach in Opoutere since 1961, now based in the United Kingdom, and both have careers in the Scotch Whisky industry.

Nick is the Managing Director for Holyrood Distillery which is the first single malt whisky distillery to operate in Edinburgh for a century. Alex is the Head of Events for Atom Brands which includes the famous independent whisky bottling brand Boutique-y Whisky Company.

The brothers are keen open water swimmers and on Friday 16th April 2021 swam from Ohui (northern end of Opoutere Beach) to Slipper Island. The swim was approximately 6km in distance and was completed by the brothers in a time well under two hours.

The brothers most recently swam The Corryvreckan, the world's third largest whirlpool, which is situated between the Isles of Jura and Scarba in the Scottish Hebrides. During this swim, they smuggled scotch whisky samples on their person and upon completing the swim the smuggled whisky was blended into a limited-edition scotch whisky called Storm Kelpie. Storm Kelpie was released as





a fundraising bottling to raise funds for Sea Shepherd NZ and support Sea Shepherd's efforts in protecting Maui and Hector's Dolphins in NZ. The 2000 bottles that were released were sold out in a week, with \$11,000 raised for Sea Shepherd.

The Slipper Island swim was a preparation swim for their next whisky smuggling swim event which will be a crossing of the English Channel on June 20th with a second crossing of the Corryvreckan planned for the 1st August. Both swims will be completed with smuggled whisky with the intent to release further fundraising bottlings for Sea Shepherd as part of a new ocean awareness campaign that they are launching called Whisky and Waves.



Inaugural Neon Surf competition

Mount Maunganui surfer Jack Hinton has been competing nationally for years through the age groups and on Sunday 11th April his relentless persistence paid off with a win at the inaugural Neon Surf Comp at Pauanui.

Hinton has been in exceptional form this season placing in the past four finals, three of those finishing runner-up. But today was Hinton's day as he took out the Under 18 Boys Division with a big win.

Hinton posted 13.53 points out of a possible 20 in the final edging out his closest rival by just under a point.

"Pauanui is kinda like home at Mount Maunganui so I am pretty used to surfing those conditions. All the boys were ripping and I am pretty stoked to beat them" he added of the 1.0m – 1.5m beach break conditions on offer.

"I am not sure what the difference is between this win and all my others finals this year, I got a bit lucky with the waves in the final. I have never won a national event before."

Hinton didn't secure the win until after the final hooter had sounded when closest rival Tom Robinson (Whangarei) surfed a nice late wave. The wave concerned Hinton but it ultimately came up short of the 6.94 required to win.

Robinson, who surfed to the highest heat score of the event in the semifinals (17.1 points) and singled highest wave score (8.83 points), had to settle for second place in the final after his explosive semifinal performance. Josef Jungwirth (Rag) surfed in his second consecutive final finishing in third ahead of Ari D'Anvers (Whangarei) in fourth.

Natasha Gouldsbury (Tara) found herself winning her second event

in as many weekends in the Under 18 Girls Division. Gouldsbury left her best surfing for the final and secured the highest single wave score of 8.1 in the final, going on to finish with a 12.37 point heat total.

"I am finally getting it done this season with two wins in two weekends" Gouldsbury said.

After two trips to the South Island

this season, Gouldsbury has opted to stay home next weekend with her next outing in home waters at the start of the next month.

Finishing runner up in the final was Piha's Liv Haysom surfing to a 10.83 point heat total. Haysom edged out Brie Bennett (Rag) who finished in third on 10.13 points with Anna Brock (Mnt) finishing in fourth.

The day started out with dense sea mist and drizzle but the sun soon broke through mid-morning as forecast and delivered a stunning afternoon with a 1.0m – 1.5m swell and light variable onshore winds.

Beau Woods (Mnt) took his first win at national level in the Under 16 Boys Division. The win comes off the back of a finals berth at the South Island Championships last weekend. Woods completed a big forehand close-out turn, momentarily disappearing in the white water before re-emerging to the surprise of everyone. The one turn netted the natural footer a 5.67 point ride and differentiated him from his opponents who were all within touching distance for the win. Tai Erceg - Gray (Whangarei) finished up in second less than a point behind Woods with Tai Murphy (Whaka) in third

and Cooper Ashill (Whangarei) in fourth.

Ava Henderson (Chch) claimed her third straight win in the Under 16 Girls Division with a comfortable victory. Henderson pushed the boundaries on several waves coming unstuck but still managed to post an 11.36 point heat total. Leia Millar (Piha) tackled the final with the same approach hitting big oncoming sections and finished runner up ahead of Skylar McFetridge (Tara) in third and Asia Braithwaite (Gis) in fourth.

Tao Mouldey (Mnt) stepped back down into his age group in the Under 14 Boys Division for this event and found himself in the tightest final of the day. Tairua surfer Zeke Wyper exchanged the lead with Mouldey several times before Mouldey clinched the win with a long running left for a 6.83 point ride. Wyper finished 0.1 points behind Mouldey on 13.1 points. Dale Cromhout (HBay) finished in third despite starting the final with an interference and Gabriel Lobb (Gis) finished in fourth

Maya Mateja continued her run of wins making it four on the trot in the Under 14 Girls Division. Mateja looked like the form surfer all weekend and in the final she posted an 11.33 point heat total for the win which comes on the back of a hat-trick of wins in the Grom Series leading into this event. Alani Morse (Orewa) finished in second with Indi-Lee Ruddell (Whangarei) in third and Talia Da Silva (Whangarei) in fourth.

The day was completed with several major spot prizes being handed out to participants before the winners were announced.

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Is a retirement village the right choice for you?

Many older people ask me whether they should go into a retirement village to live. There is no right or wrong answer but people need to look at the advantages and disadvantages so I will set out some of the main points to consider. Advantages 1. Less worries and responsibilities with one weekly payment covering rates, building insurance, grounds maintenance and upkeep of the buildings. 2. Weekly payment is often fixed for life so no concerns about future price rises. 3. Opportunities to share in village life and using common facilities such as gym, pool, on site restaurant and the like depending on the village. 4. Group outings and new friends to be made. 5. You can get priority for greater care if you need to transfer to a hospital type facility. Disadvantages 1. You do not own a title to the unit or villa but you purchase a licence to occupy. 2. If you don't like living in the village and want to sell up it can take a while to sell. 3. You can typically lose up to 30% of the entry cost so that for example if you paid \$900,000 for a right to occupy and after 3 years decided the lifestyle is not for you the amount you receive on sale would only be \$630,000. It might then be difficult to rehouse yourself. 4. Your community consists only of old people 5. Residents may expect you to join in with activities that you are not interested in. Whatever you decide, the decision is a big one and you need to think it over carefully.



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
